NC Executive Order 303

Executive Order 303, titled *Establishing a Unified Approach to* Improving Education, Rehabilitation, and Reentry Services for Incarcerated and Formerly Incarcerated people in North Carolina was signed by Governor Cooper on January 29, 2024.

The Order directs Whole-of-Government Coordination to achieve these goals:

- Improve economic mobility of formerly incarcerated people by increasing the number of local reentry counci and providing access to educational, technical training, apprenticeship, work-based learning and employment opportunities pre-and post-release.
- Improve mental and physical health by expanding access to behavioral health and substance use disorder services pre- and post-release and ensuring that all eligible incarcerated people obtain Medicaid upon release.
- Expand housing opportunities for formerly incarcerated people.
- Remove barriers to successful community reintegration especially for those returning to historically underserved communities.

It directs the NC Department of Adult Correction (NCDAC) to lea a coordinated effort to establish a multi-agency **Strategic Plan** for Reentry 2030 to establish strategies and metrics to achieve those goals.

Reentry 2030

Executive Order 303 coincides with North Carolina joining the Council of State Governments - Justice Center *Reentry 2030* initiative. North Carolina becomes the third state [as of 1/29/24] to join *Reentry 2030*, after Missouri and Alabama [and now Nebraska as of 2/1/24].

Reentry 2030 calls upon states to establish bold goals and achieve transformative outcomes for people exiting prison. North Carolina has established these specific *Reentry* 2030 goals, which align with the broader goals written in the Executive Order.

- Reduce the number of incarcerated individuals who are homeless upon release by 50%.
- Provide reentry assistance to returning citizens in every county in the state through Local Reentry Councils.
- Increase the number of high school and post-secondary credentials earned by incarcerated individuals by 75%.
- Increase the number of post-secondary degrees offered in facilities by 25%.
- Increase the number of Pell Grant partners by 30%.
- Ensure all eligible incarcerated individuals are offered the opportunity to apply for Medicaid before release. Increase the number of apprenticeships completed by
- incarcerated individuals by 50%.
- Increase the number of second chance employer partners by 30%.

JUMPSTART NC is well aligned with NCDAC initiatives, including Executive Order 303 and Reentry 2030

RESULTS

Those who complete the program:



More than **7,000** men and women have participated in JUMPSTART since its inception in 2008.

More than **3,700** graduates with **96%*** staying out of prison for those who are released.

*3-year recidivism (reincarceration excluding parole/probation violations, cohorts 2017-2021)



Accelerated Growth in 2025 with the New Strategy Expansion to 30 camps by 2030






Using base camps, replication to adjacent camps, and succession planning, we can expand the Inside Program to 30 camps by the end of 2030.

- 3. Replicate to adjacent camps










Broad Support

Support will be built in phases, progressing to the next level over time.






