Eligible to Apply:

The following entities in North Carolina are eligible to apply for funding under the identified Juvenile Justice Planning Committee program priorities:

- <u>Local government agencies</u>
- Local law enforcement
- <u>State government agencies</u>
- <u>State law enforcement</u>
- <u>Nonprofit organizations</u>, including Faith-based and Community Organizations

Grant project period: January 1, 2022 – December 31, 2023

- FY 2021 Title II Formula Grant Funding Two Years
- FY 2021 Children's Justice Act Funding Two Years

Juvenile Justice Planning Committee 2021 Funding Priorities

Mission Statement

JJPC provides resources for youth at-risk of becoming delinquent due to individual, school, family, peer and/or community factors.

Resources provide services for youth who are delinquent, undisciplined, or involved in the juvenile court process.



Raise the Age Implementation:

• <u>Sustainability & Support;</u>

- Requires process changes, program expansion, and infrastructure support.
- Influx of 16/17 year old's into the juvenile justice system changes the juvenile justice system's capacity & approach.
- Juvenile serving agencies, including local entities will need support in implementing raise the age.

• <u>Solutions</u>

- Provide training to LE working with juveniles.
- Offer crisis & assessment solutions as alternatives to detention.
- Referral of services to prevent recidivism/penetration into the system.
- Community specific intervention strategies.



Raise the Age Implementation continued:

Programming ideas include:

- Interagency training, conferences/ workshops to comply with "Raise the Age".
- Funding to support additional attorneys, social workers, investigators and secretarial services for juvenile public defender offices.
- Funding to support prosecution, investigators, and clerks for juvenile prosecution offices.
- Funding to support multisystemic therapy services for delinquent juveniles.



School Justice Partnerships:

- Creation of Partnerships.
- Grant requests creating safer school environments.
- Focus on more effective alternatives to suspension for minor discipline problems.
- Alternatives such as Teen Court, crisis and assessment services, academic coaches, school-based community service, and restitution.

2021 Racial Ethnic Disparities (RED):

- Youth of color are more likely to be disciplined, suspended, and expelled.
- Less likely to be diverted, more likely to be held in secure detention, and overrepresented at key points throughout the juvenile justice system.
- GCC supports efforts to reduce Racial & Ethnic Disparities (RED) in the juvenile justice system .
- Applications for this priority must explain how their project aims to reduce disparities and/or promote racial equity.

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• 2021 Children's Justice:

Intended for systems change to improve the handling/outcomes of child maltreatment.

• Programs funded include:

- Improving Investigative, Administrative, & Judicial Handling of child sexual abuse and exploitation.
- Cases involving suspected child-maltreatment related fatalities.
- Focused on serving intrastate & interstate cases reducing trauma to victims & families.



- II. 2021 Children's Justice supports programs improving resolutions of civil and criminal court proceedings:
 - Enhance judicial & administrative actions in child abuse & neglect cases.
 - Enhance performances of court appointed attorneys & guardians ad litem for children.
 - Ensures procedural fairness to the accused.



III. 2021 Children's Justice supports reforming state laws, ordinances, regulations, protocols, & procedures providing protection for children:

- May include children in reports of child abuse or neglect with a combination of jurisdictions, such as intrastate, interstate, Federal and Tribal.
- May involve child abuse & neglect, including sexual abuse and exploitation.
