Eckerd Connects' Short-Term Juvenile Justice Residential program is a complete rehabilitative experience delivered in four to six months to 24 adjudicated male youth, ages 13 – 17, as referred by the North Carolina Department of Public Safety Division of Juvenile Justice. This residential treatment concept combines promising and evidence-based practices with a strong family transition component, and signifies a public-private partnership with the Division of Juvenile Justice which has produced an innovative shift in the way youth are served in North Carolina's juvenile justice system. Intensive, short-term services include individualized treatment and academic plans that combine formal and experiential education, community service, behavioral health, and family counseling in a non-punitive environment designed to address the youth's behavioral challenges through a strength-based approach. Youth also receive accredited education on-site and work together in small group settings with assigned counselors.





Dylan was 17 years old when he was admitted into Eckerd Connects' Short-Term Residential program in Boomer, NC. He was struggling with marijuana use and had issues within his family dynamics. Even though both of his parents were loving, their divorce had a huge impact on him. Dylan didn't get along with his father – at times refusing to speak to him – even though it was his father who had legal custody.

During his 90-day stay at Eckerd Connects, Dylan demonstrated personal perseverance and self-confidence. He was able to move past his own emotional barriers and start to build a better relationship with his father. Dylan had issues within himself as well, and therapy provided through Eckerd Connects' residential services helped strengthen him. He was given the Good Citizenship award and was also able to finish his senior project while on campus. Dylan took upon leadership roles not only for his care group but for the other groups as well. One of example of this is Dylan teaching his group and others how to resurface a table, a skill they used to sand and stain the tables in the dining hall.

Dylan made remarkable changes while in the program and will continue with the strong, loving support of his family.
