

### **Three-Year Planning - Questions to Consider**

*As you develop plans for your next Three-Year Plan, consider the below questions. This is not a comprehensive list, rather a resource to get your group thinking and talking. Develop a planning agenda that aligns with your council's way of doing business, honors all voices, and increases the likelihood of a robust discussion.*

#### Understanding Responsibilities

1. What questions remain regarding the JJRA/JJDPa and core requirements?
2. How does the IJJC stay updated on/collaborate with compliance with the Core Requirements?

#### Partners & Voice

1. What role or roles do you represent?
2. What do your perspectives/networks/experiences bring to the IJJC?
3. Where are the opportunities to enhance application of your perspective?
4. List voices/perspectives that are missing from our discussion.
5. How can we engage these voices?
6. What responsibilities are members excelling with? Struggling with?

#### Understanding the Environment

1. List current juvenile justice efforts underway in Idaho. Consider local campaigns or planning initiatives, legislation, policy change, reform efforts, calls to action by community leaders/governing bodies, etc.
2. Consider doing a SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats) analysis. This captures...
  - a. Strengths – What's underway, successful or an asset of the district?
  - b. Weakness – What gaps, needs, or challenges exist within the district?
  - c. Opportunities – What initiatives, funding, policy change, current event or public willingness exists in the state environment that could be leveraged?
  - d. Threats – What initiatives, competition, shortages, public sentiment, policy change, or current events could inhibit IJJC's efforts.
3. How is IJJC connected to these efforts?
  - a. If so, how does that impact or connect to our work moving forward?
  - b. If not, how do we connect and/or stay informed?
  - c. How do these efforts highlight areas where we can be supportive and/or avoid duplication?
4. What needs exist for youth that are not being addressed by an existing initiative (i.e. policy change, taskforce, program, pilot, etc.)?

#### Identifying Priorities

1. What piques your interest most about the JJDPa/JJRA?
2. Reflecting on the current Three-Year Plan...
  - a. What progress has been made?
  - b. Describe the barriers encountered.
  - c. What gaps were uncovered?
  - d. What's left to do/what next steps can be taken?
3. What items seem most pertinent to the Juvenile Justice environment in Idaho?
4. Which potential priorities is IJJC best positioned to tackle?

#### Developing an Action Plan

1. How is data currently used to build and track your Three-Year Plan?
2. What data or information could the 2021-23 Three-Year plan?
3. How can we use data to track progress on the selected priorities?
4. What resources/information are needed?
5. How do we partner with the Idaho Juvenile Justice Commission and state staff?
