North Carolina Emergency Management Hazardous Materials Grants Overview

FY22 Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness Program (HMEP)

Purpose:

The HMEP grant program was established in 1990 by the Hazardous Materials Transportation Uniform Safety Act. In 1993, PHMSA began issuing grants to assist States, Territories, and Native American Tribes to "develop, improve, and carry out emergency plans" within the National Response System and the Emergency Planning and Community Right-To-Know Act of 1986. The HMEP grant program is designed to allow grantees the flexibility to implement training and planning programs that address differing needs for each location based on demographics, emergency response capabilities, commodity flow studies, and hazard analysis.

FY 2022 Tier II Non-competitive Grant Program (Tier II NC)

Purpose:

Tier II non-competitive grants provide Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPCs) funding to expand the scope of their hazardous materials emergency preparedness programs though response planning, training and related exercises. All active LEPCs awarded under this program receive non-competitive grant funds from the hazardous materials facility fees collected during the Tier II reporting period. The Tier II non-competitive grants must be used for hazardous materials emergency response planning, training and related exercises, with some conditions and limitations in accordance with the provisions of N.C.G.S. §166A-29.1. Operational equipment is currently ineligible for this grant.

Grant Amount Estimate:

\$1,000.00 maximum per award, per LEPC jurisdiction covered. If an LEPC provides coverage to more than one jurisdiction, their grant amount will reflect such.

FY 2022 Tier II Competitive Grant Program (Tier II NC)

Purpose:

Tier II competitive grants provide Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPCs) funding to expand the scope of their hazardous materials emergency preparedness programs though response planning, training and related exercises. All active LEPCs awarded under this program receive non-competitive grant funds from the hazardous materials facility fees collected during the Tier II reporting period. The Tier II non-competitive grants must be used for hazardous materials emergency response planning, training and related exercises, with some conditions and limitations in accordance with the provisions of N.C.G.S. §166A-29.1. Operational equipment is currently ineligible for this grant.

Grant Amount Estimate:

\$10,000.00 maximum per award; total of \$60,000.00 available statewide. Amounts may vary due to requests processed.
